

Tax Collector Nancy C. Millan Visits Kings Point



On February 14, 2024, at the Master Association meeting in the Veterans Theater Nancy C. Millan – Hillsborough County Tax Collector explained the property tax process, the services the tax collector's office offers, and expressed excitement about the tax collectors' increased accessibility to the community.

To begin, Ms. Millan explained the tax process. The property appraiser (Bob Henriquez - Hillsborough County Property Appraiser) determines the property value and processes exemptions. Tax Authorities calculate millage rates that produce revenue and mail the Notice of Proposed Property Tax to the property owner giving the owner time to appeal the decision. The tax collector mails the Property Tax Bills in November with payment due by March 30th. Finally, the tax collector distributes those payments to the Taxing Authorities.

Currently the tax collector's office does more than just "collect property tax". They are an agent for the Department of Transportation, offering motor vehicle registrations, road testing, and issuing drivers licenses. In addition, they work with other state agencies to issue copies of Florida Birth Certificates, provides concealed weapons permits, vehicle hire permits, and Hunting & Fishing Licenses.

Finally, Ms. Millan was excited to share that she and her team are working on making services more accessible. First, most services that the tax collector's office provides can be accessed online at hillstax.org. They have installed kiosks throughout the county to provide the ability to renew and print registrations without waiting in long lines. In addition, they are adding virtual assistants (like a virtual bank teller) where yoù can pull up in a drive-thru and be able to process services via the agent. Finally, they are in the process of obtaining à bus to create a mobile unit whereby they could come to

With a mission to foster a healthier, more resilient ecosystem, TBEP implements science-based initiatives aimed at improving water quality, restoring habitats, and enhancing biodiversity the throughout Tampa watershed.

As the leader of TBEP, Ed Sherwood brings years of experience in environmental management and conservation to his role. Under his guidance, TBEP has spearheaded numerous successful projects,

including the restoration of vital wetlands, and the promotion of sustainable land use practices. TBEP has earned recognition as a model for collaborative environmental innovation, inspiring communities across the region to work together towards a common goal of environmental sustainability.

Sherwood's visit to the Kings Point Pond Committee provided attendees with valuable insights into the broader environmental challenges facing the Tampa Bay area, as well as the collaborative efforts underway to address them. On February 22, 2024, Pond Chair Rob Davies led the third seminar of the year for the Kings Point Committee, focusing on the committee's ongoing initiatives within the community. Part of which is the ongoing three-year project "Adopt A Pond" with the county to leverage resources and expertise to enhance the ecological health and management of select ponds within the community. ### 1. The Real St. Patrick Was Born in Britain - Much of what is known about St. Patrick's life has been interwoven with folklore and legend. Historians generally believe that St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Britain (not Ireland) near the end of the 4th century. At age 16 he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and sold as a slave to a Celtic priest in the area now known as Northern Ireland. After toiling for six years as a shepherd, he escaped back to Britain. He eventually returned to Ireland as a Christian missionary.

- 2. There Were No Snakes Around for St. Patrick to Banish from Ireland Among the legends associated with St. Patrick is that he stood atop an Irish hillside and banished snakes from Ireland—prompting all serpents to slither away into the sea. In fact, research suggests snakes never occupied the Emerald Isle in the first place. There are no signs of snakes in the country's fossil record. And water has surrounded Ireland since the last glacial period. Before that, the region was covered in ice and would have been too cold for the reptiles.
- 3. Leprechauns Are Likely Based on Celtic Fairies - The red-haired, greenclothed Leprechaun is commonly

associated with St. Patrick's Day. The original Irish name for these figures of folklore is "lobaircin," meaning "smallbodied fellow." Belief in leprechauns likely stems from Celtic belief in fairies—tiny men and women who could use their magical powers to serve good or evil. In Celtic folktales, leprechauns were cranky souls, responsible for mending the shoes of the other fairies.

- 4. The Shamrock Was Considered a Sacred Plant - The shamrock, a threeleaf clover, has been associated with Ireland for centuries. It was called the "seamroy" by the Celts and was considered a sacred plant that symbolized the arrival of spring. According to legend, St. Patrick used the plant as a visual guide when explaining the Holy Trinity. By the 17th century, the shamrock had become a symbol of emerging Irish nationalism.
- 5. The First St. Patrick's Day Parade Was Held in America - While people

in Ireland had celebrated St. Patrick since the 1600s, the tradition of a St. Patrick's Day parade began in America and actually predates the founding of the United States. Records show that a St. Patrick's Day parade was held on March 17, 1601, in a Spanish colony in what is now St. Augustine, Florida. The parade and a St. Patrick's Day celebration a year earlier were organized by the Spanish Colony's Irish vicar Ricardo Artur. More than a century later, homesick Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched in Boston in 1737 and in New York City on March 17. Enthusiasm for the St. Patrick's Day parades in New York City, Boston and other early American cities only grew from there. In 2020 and 2021, parades throughout the country, including in New York City and Boston, were canceled or postponed for the first time in decades due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 virus. They returned in 2022.

6. The Irish Were Once Scorned in

America - While Irish Americans are now proud to showcase their heritage, the Irish were not always celebrated by fellow Americans. Beginning in 1845, a devastating potato blight caused widespread hunger throughout Ireland. While approximately 1 million perished, another 2 million abandoned their land in the largest-single population movement of the 19th century. Most of the exiles—nearly a quarter of the Irish nation—came to the shores of the United States. Once they arrived, the Irish refugees were looked down upon as disease-ridden, unskilled and a drain on welfare budgets.

7. Corned Beef and Cabbage Was an American made dish - The meal that became a St. Patrick's Day staple across the countrycorned beef and cabbage—was an American innovation. While ham and cabbage were eaten in Ireland, corned beef offered a cheaper substitute for impoverished immigrants. Irish Americans living in the slums of lower Manhattan in the late 19th century and early 20th purchased leftover corned beef from ships returning from the tea trade in China. The Irish would boil the beef three times—the last time with cabbage—to remove some of

Q1. In communities that use pesticide lawn/landscape chemical treatment, are these chemicals concerns but not necessarily safety question came up when several pets were seen in local veterinary clinics for vomiting, diarrhea, and paw irritation coincidentally around the time of a lawn treatment per pet owners. No link was found. According to manufacturers and EPA (Environmental Protection Agency), products used for community landscapes are "safe" when used as directed. "Safe" does not address



rare allergic reactions or reactions in sick pets. EPA identifies environmental dangerous to pets? Last spring this to pets—especially if it takes years for impacts to appear. For example, there are now lawsuits regarding "Round Up" and its effect on people who applied this product years ago. There are complex issues that include but are not limited to: the product, how it is stored, diluted, used and the skill, knowledge, and training of the people who purchase, store, and apply the product. Dilution mistakes are rare.



## Pet Vet Question 2 - MARCH 2024

Q2. What is stress in pets and how member. Pets react to our stress. can I tell if my pet is stressed? Stress causes adrenalin release for a "fight or flight" response to danger. Signs include, but are not limited to, increased heart rate, breathing, fear, not eating, wide pupils, tail tucked, not interactive, cowering, shaking. They can bark, beat their tails, hiss, growl or just back away. Subtle signs include not interacting or hiding.

Cause can be anything inside or outside. Cats and dogs can hear and smell much better than we do. Stress/anxiety can be caused by changes to schedule, furniture, visitors, scents, suitcases, boxes, pet travel boxes, construction or anything that is not normal routine. Sick or stressed owners also cause their pets to be stressed i.e recent visit to a hospital, loss of job, a death in the family, a new family or pet

Stress and anxiety are helpful to get through a challenge, but like all chronic stress—has negative effects on health. There are prescription and non-prescription products for pets. Examples of non-prescription products include Adaptyl/ Thunderease (dogs), Feliway (cats) or Zylkene, Thundershirt, darkened room with background noise. Short term products (ie car ride, vet visit) include trazodone, gabapentin and others. There are longer term prescription products. All are intended to be used only until the stress is relieved or when coupled with desensitization / behavior techniques modification provide slow and steady reduction to stress or noise and require patience and time. There are behavior specialists (not just trainers) that can help.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -Attorney General Ashley Moody is issuing a Consumer Alert to warn Floridians about fraudsters digitally altering checks, commonly called check cooking. This complex process involves fraudsters taking photos of stolen checks and using digital tools to alter critical information, such as the payee's name and the amount, and then cashing the forgeries.

Recently, General Attorney Moody's Cyber Fraud Enforcement Unit assisted law enforcement in an investigation involving a Tampa man who manipulated checks. The fraudster stole more than \$50,000 from victims and now faces 30 years in prison.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "Fraudsters are now digitally altering stolen checks to fill their own bank accounts while draining those of the victims—like a Tampa Bay resident who stole more than \$50,000 before our Cyber Fraud Enforcement Unit caught up with him. Although scary, staying informed will help Floridians avoid

## Consumer Warning By Attorney General Ashley Moody

falling victim to digital check manipulation schemes.

The crime begins when a fraudster gains access to legitimate checks, often stolen from mailboxes. This allows fraudsters access to checks with authentic watermarks that banksuse for verification. Armed with the stolen check images, fraudsters use graphic editing software to alter crucial details, such as the payee's name, the payment amount and other important information. After the digital alterations are complete, fraudsters create counterfeit checks to closely resemble legitimate ones and use the counterfeit to withdraw funds from unsuspecting individuals' accounts.

Attorney General Moody's CFEU charged Tampa resident Donald Johnson for operating a check cooking scheme. According to the law enforcement investigation, Johnson stole checks from mailboxes of local businesses and then altered the registered agent names of the businesses to the defendant's own name. Johnson then endorsed the checks as if originally meant for

Johnson and proceeded to defraud local banks by cashing the checks. Since Johnson appeared as the registered agent of the businesses, the check could be cashed and the funds directly deposited.

Attorney General Moody offers the following tips to help Floridians avoid falling victim to digital check manipulation:

- Secure Mailboxes: Check mailboxes regularly and talk to trusted neighbors to help keep a watchful eye to help prevent the theft of documents, including sensitive checks;
- Monitor Constantly Accounts: bank and financial monitor statements for any unauthorized or suspicious transactions;
- Check for Unusual Delays: Beware of unexpected delays in receiving mailed checks, as this could indicate potential tampering or theft; and
- E-Checks: Consider Contact financial institutions about using e-checks to make payments online, rather than risk using a physical check.

the spring. By strategically removing dead or damaged branches, you promote the development of strong, vigorous shoots. This technique involves carefully choosing which branches to prune. Typically, dead or damaged branches are targeted for removal.Removing these branches not only improves

the overall appearance of the plant but also eliminates potential entry points for diseases and pests. When spring arrives (March 19th), the plant is ready to respond with new growth from the areas where pruning occurred. This can result in a fuller, healthier, and more vibrant plant.

**Shape and Structure:** Shaping your plants during the dormant season allows for better control over their form and structure. This is especially important for trees and shrubs, as it helps maintain a pleasina aesthetic while preventing overcrowding.


